Project Overview:

On Sunday, September 14th, the Latine Environmental Colectivo hosted "Cafecito Green" to kick off Latino Conservation Week, Sept. 14-22. We invited members of our community to join us in conversation at the new First Tee Cleveland facility in Newburgh Heights. Though turn out for the event was limited, we learned a lot and feel that our conversation went deeper due to the small group size. We asked questions such as, "What are the most pressing environmental issues facing our community today?" and "How do cultural values and traditions within the Latine community influence our attitudes towards environmental conservation?" Spanish interpretation services were available for the duration.

Topics:

- What are the most pressing environmental issues facing our community today, and how do they impact our daily lives?
- How do cultural values and traditions within the Latine community influence our attitudes towards environmental conservation?
- What are some successful examples of Latinxled environmental initiatives or projects that we can learn from or replicate?
- · What role does access to resources and education play in shaping environmental awareness and action within the Latinx community?

Reflections:

- 1. Because such a small group attended, the dialog was deeper, felt more authentic, and real. This is something we'll want to consider when we host larger groups.
- 2. Location was easy to find, and the meeting space was amazing.
- 3. Nine people registered, 3 people attended. We believe this had to do with competing events, good weather, and hosting on Sunday.





Project name: Rain Barrel Workshop

Project Date: Sept. 18, 2024

Project Overview:

On Wednesday, Sept. 18th, we came together at Future Ink Graphics for a rain barrel workshop with pupusas from Guanaguitas, for a presentation from Cuyahoga Soil & Water Conservation District, and for rain barrel painting with Cleveland artist, Linda Zolten Wood (Collinwood Painted Rain Barrel Project). The presentation by CSWCD provided a background on the organization, explained the current sources of pollution effecting water quality, and how rain barrels can be a part of the solution. Afterwards, attendees were able to sign up for up to 2 rain barrels for their home (for pickup) and help paint the rain barrel that was planned to be raffled off later in the week at our culminating celebration.

Topics:

- Mission and background of Cuyahoga Soil & Water Conservation District
 - From the Dust Bowl of the 1930s to the burning of the Cuyahoga River in the 1950s/1960s
- Clean Water Act of 1972
- What is a watershed?
 - Nonpoint source pollution
- Rain Barrels benefits, importance, and set up.

Reflections:

- 1.FIG is a really cool space that fit the artsy vibe of the workshop itself. The owner was very accommodating.
- 2. The most challenging part was the rain barrel giveaway. They needed to pick up the barrels from CSWCD's office, which was a different location than where the workshop was held.
- 3.18 rain barrels were given away, which has the potential to divert 1,000 gal of stormwater runoff.
- 4. Attendees would like another workshop to share the information with their neighbors. They appreciated receiving the presentation with SWCD first before signing up for the rain barrels.
